BOB NOTES...

Since I last wrote this column, a lot has happened in my life. Namely, the visit I made with the porch when I decided in a split second on a beautiful snowy Christmas Eve afternoon that I should not pay attention to what I was doing and therefore fall right into it. And as most of you know, in the process of trying not to fall, I ruptured the tendon that holds the quadriceps muscle in place and therefore allows us to bend the knee. God has been with me throughout this ordeal and now I am starting to improve. Therefore, it's time to pick up with our series on the books of the Bible. This month we close out the Old Testament with the Minor Prophets.

As I mentioned last month, the Minor Prophets are called such not because they are less important than the Major Prophets, but because the books are much shorter in length.

There are twelve books in the Minor Prophets. A synopsis is included below.

<u>Hosea</u>, whose name means "the Lord saves" has as his major themes: God suffers when His people are unfaithful; God cannot condone sin; and God will never cease to love his own and will seek to win back those who have forsaken him.

<u>Joel</u> whose name means the "Lord is God" describes the invasion of Judah by a plague of locusts that destroyed everything and impoverished the people. The prophet looks far into the future at coming judgment and coming joys.

<u>Amos</u> whose name means "to bear a load" was burdened over the sin of the northern kingdom in the eight century before Christ. Amos was outraged at the violence they had done to the justice and righteousness of God. God pleads with them to return to Him. Judgments are declared as well as the final restoration of Israel predicted.

<u>Obadiah</u> means "worshiper of the Lord". His prophecy is generally believed to have been written one year after Judah was taken into exile in Babylon. The theme of this short, one chapter book centers upon the doom of Edom.

<u>Jonah</u> is probably the best known of these twelve books. His name means "dove". The book centers on the prophet whom God called to warn the people of Nineveh of coming judgment.

He refuses and runs away on a ship going in the opposite direction. A storm comes along and Jonah is thrown overboard and ends up in the belly of a large fish. Jonah spends three days in the fish before he repents and is delivered. He goes to Nineveh, warns of the judgment, and God relents from his planned destruction. The theme of this book is God's mercy.

<u>Micah</u> whose name means "who is like the Lord" was written in the 8th century BC. The book is divided between condemnation and captivity; reproof and restoration; and pleading and assurance of mercy. "Loving justice, showing mercy, and walking humbly with God" is encouraged.

<u>Nahum</u> whose name means "comfort of God" is related to Nehemiah. He prophesied during the 7th century BC and the book forms a sequel to Jonah. Whereas in Jonah the people of Nineveh repented, in Nahum the capture of Nineveh by the Babylonians and their allies is detailed. The cause of their destruction is explained.

<u>Habakkuk</u> whose name means "embrace" prophesied to Judah concerning the impending invasion by the Chaldeans (Babylonians). He was a man of a deeply tender nature and spiritual character and manifested a great love for the people. His questions and doubts arise from his jealousy for the holiness and justice of God.

<u>Zephaniah</u> whose name means "the Lord hides or protects" was a great-great grandson of King Hezekiah. He prophesied probably during the great revival of 621 BC in the time of King Josiah. He also predicts the coming invasion by the Babylonians and makes predictions of judgment coming to surrounding nations as well.

<u>Haqqai</u> whose name means "festive" was one of the early prophets following Judah's release from captivity. His ministry was to rebuke the returning exiles for their delay in rebuilding the Temple and to encourage them to set to work.

<u>Zechariah</u> whose name means "the Lord remembers" was a prophet of restoration from Babylon. The book includes a series of eight visions to comfort Jerusalem as well as prophecies concerning the end of the age of Israel and the reign of the Messiah.

<u>Malachi</u> whose name means "my messenger" is the last book of the Old Testament. This final message of the Old Testament contains the prophecy of the ministry of John the Baptist. The book challenges the corruption of priests and the sins of the people against the family and their miserly attitude toward God. The book end thus the Old Testament ends with a prophecy about the Coming Day of the Lord and the return of the Messiah.

Next month, in the month of March, we will be right in the middle of Lent, and we will begin our explanation of the books of the New Testament.

LENTEN BIBLE STUDY BEGINS FEBRUARY 22




