Do you ever find yourself thinking that your prayers are often nothing more than repeating the same thing you've been praying for years? Do you ever stop to think that perhaps your prayers should be more specific? Doesn't it seem like we really should only have to ask God for something one time instead of constantly saying the same thing?

These questions and more may or may not have ever occurred to you, but they are important ones to consider when we think about our prayer life.

There are a few incidents in the gospels where we can find some answers to these questions. Let's deal with the first one, "repeating the same thing over", or "constantly saying the same thing."

In Luke 18, Jesus teaches the "Parable of the Persistent Widow". This is also known as the "Parable of the Unjust Judge". In it, Jesus tells about a judge who had no concern, respect for, or fear of God. The judge could care less what people thought about him either. Yet, there was a widow who continued to come to him apparently day after day. She kept asking the judge to grant her justice against her adversary. Verse 4 tells us that for some time the judge refused. But the widow remained persistent. Eventually in order to get this widow off his back, he sees to it that she gets justice from her adversary.

His reasoning seems kind of self-centered, and reminds me of how when our kids were growing up, they knew that if they bothered us about something long enough, eventually we would relent just to get them to stop bothering us. It was not a healthy way of parenting but sometimes we were just too tired or busy to deal with it, and we'd relent.

Here in this parable, the judge grows weary and grants the widow's request. And then Jesus goes on to say, "Listen to what the unjust judge says. And will not God bring about justice for his chosen ones, who cry out to him day and night? Will he keep putting them off? I tell you; he will see that they get justice, and quickly." Although quickly is by God's estimation, not human. In essence, Jesus is telling his disciples that we should remain persistent in our prayers. We should continue to ask, and not to give up in our asking. So yes, keep asking. The answers will come. And, we need to start believing that the answers will come even though they might not come as fast as we would like.

The other question I posed above was the question about our prayers being more specific. In Mark 10:46-51, there is a blind man named Bartimaeus who was sitting on the road begging. When Jesus came by, he shouted, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me." The crowd rebuked him and basically told him to shut up. But he kept shouting all the more, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me."

Jesus stops and calls the man to him. And in verse 51 Jesus asks him what he wanted the man to do for him. Wait a minute. The guy had been shouting, asking for Jesus to have mercy on him. And since he was

blind, one would assume Jesus knew that Bartimaeus wanted his sight restored. But Jesus asked him point blank. "What do you want me to do for you?" "I want to see", Bartimaeus responded. Jesus responds, "Go, your faith has healed you." Immediately he received his sight. However, it wasn't until he directly told Jesus he wanted to see, that his sight was restored.

How often do we just say something along the lines of "bless all of my loved ones", without going through and praying anything specific about them? How often do we say, "Lord, help me through this situation" without directly asking God for the desired outcome. Or if we hear of a tragic situation, we might pray, "Lord, be with the family", or "Lord, help them through". What if we tried to find out more details so that we could pray more specifically? I know, this might create a really long and detailed prayer list, but if you seek out God in directing you, God will help you to focus. Beyond this, a lot of times in life we complain about situations and people and circumstances that are not as we think they should be. My question is, "how often do we ever stop to pray specifically for any of them?" Or, would we rather just keep on complaining?

Thus, never give up in praying for someone or something or your own needs. God wants us to remain diligent in our prayers. And unlike the unjust judge, and unlike ourselves, God does not grow tired of our asking. In fact, God expects us to ask; and to be specific about what we are asking for.

As we do so, our faith in and our relationship with God can strengthen.
