From the Pastor

Twice each year, it is my turn to write a column for *The Carroll County Comet*. The column is entitled "Lessons from the Heart". The pastors in the area are on a rotation. And even though Rossville is technically not in Carroll County, they still ask Rossville area pastors since we are only a mile from the county line.

The week of June 17th was my turn. I include the article I submitted to *The Comet* here in *The Echo* for July, and I hope it brings some perspective at this time we are facing in our nation related to matters of race.

Does it seem like we are living in one continuous loop? The same types of incidents continue to happen. The same types of responses to those incidents occur. Every entity feels pressured to distribute or post some kind of public statement so that everyone will know we stand against racism. New laws are proposed. Challenges are heard. Demonstrations are organized. Most start out quiet and peaceful. Many of the demonstrations are soon taken over by those who loot, destroy, and burn property. Sadly, more innocent lives are lost in the process.

And soon... And soon, it is all placed on the back burner as we move onto the next news cycle. The names change. The details of the incidents vary from one to the next. Yet, they still continue. Whether it was George Floyd, and then Rayshard Brooks less than two weeks later. Or Breonna Taylor a few weeks before all of this. The names continue. I hope this time things will change. This time...

As a follower of Christ, it is tempting to get caught up in all of the talk and responses, and forget what we are called to. We are called to love God, and to love people. (Mark 12:30-31). Sometimes this is easier than others. Yet, in a time where people automatically seem to jump to the worst conclusions about any person or group which holds a different opinion than themselves, it becomes difficult. Still, we are called to love. What would happen if more people began to "take a deep breath and pray a prayer" before lashing out? Why do we so easily paint everyone into different corners with a "broad brush?" Most of the people who protest are not looters for example. And the vast majority of police officers are not out there seeking to make life difficult for those of other races.

I guess what I am saying in all of this comes not only from the Bible, but is echoed in an old song we used to sing in my youth group in high school in the early 1980's. It goes like this.

"Love, love, love, love. The gospel in a word is love. Love thy neighbor as thy brother or sister. Love. Love. Love." Maybe it sounds too simplistic. But I believe it is the best place to start.

Rossville UMC receives "Connect Through Tech" grant

Rossville United Methodist Church has been awarded a grant in the amount of just under \$5,000 for the use of improving our audio and live stream capabilities. Our microphones and sound capabilities will be up-



graded. And, we will purchase equipment which will allow us to present a higher quality production of our service on live stream. Along with our current connection through FaceBook, we will add the capability of linking the service through You Tube as well as to our church's website. People will be able to view our service without having to go onto FaceBook once this is in place. This will help us to reach more people who do not attend our church with the weekly service, as well as provide an outlet for those who are unable to attend on a Sunday to still participate in the service.

The grant was provided by the Indiana Center for Congregations through resources provided by Eli Lilly, Our goal is to have the new equipment up and running by the end of the summer.
