I was driving back into Rossville from Adrienne, Christian, and Grace's on the early evening of August 24th. This was the weekend of the Summer's End Festival, and I had just dropped Grace back home after her and I spent some time on a "bapa-granddaughter" date at the festival. About a mile south of Rossville School, I noticed some smoke. At first, I didn't think anything of it. As I drove closer however, I thought to myself, "people aren't allowed to burn

trash in the town limits." By the time I got to the light in town, I could see that the smoke was coming from closer to where we live. As I turned in the alley from the east and saw flames, I realized it was the garage of the house behind the church. The fire had, at that point, only been burning for a fairly short period of time, but it was spreading quickly. The fire department had not yet arrived. And, there was panic (as one would imagine) among the family members who lived in the house. Thankfully, they had all been able to get out. Once the fire department arrived, they were able to start knocking down the fire. But fairly extensive damage had occurred. Some flames had made it to the edge of the home, and smoke damage in the home is widespread.

A few thoughts. The family involved are nice folks, but generally, like so many in our time, keep pretty much to themselves. They now are in great need. The fire was just the latest in a string of recent challenges for them. One doesn't realize what a community has or does not have in place when a crisis of this magnitude occurs. I am told that thankfully this happened on a Saturday because most of the volunteer fire department personnel were available. Word has it, that in the middle of the day, when everyone is working, there are times when Rossville Fire only has a very limited number of firefighters available. Other departments would need to be called in to assist, which of course would take more time to get the needed help to the scene. The firefighters, EMT, and police personnel in our area are very diligent, and each person knew exactly what to do upon arrival. They are all well-trained.

Also, the Red Cross in the Lafayette area did not have the people available to come to scene. They were called in. And, they provided everything digitally over the phone and arranged housing for the family, but were unable to send people or resources to the home. In comparison, a few years ago when a home burned southeast of Rossville at which two children lost their lives, the Red Cross came from Lafayette with a full range of supplies and food.

The church was able to be the church both on Saturday and the days following. I was able to open the church as a cooling center for overheated firefighters. And, the money collected at the Community-wide summer's end worship service on Sunday to assist the family was very generous.

Other thoughts occurred to me. One just never knows what any day might bring. We never know when something like this will hit "close to home". It is important that we pray for our neighbors, whether we see them very often or not. They all face the same kinds of challenges that you are most likely facing. Most importantly, stay committed each day to the work of Christ. You might be called upon to assist as God enables you at an unexpected moment. Even if it is just bringing some bottled water over to someone.


SEPTEMBER 29th SERVICE, CARRY IN DINNER, AND ANTIQUE CAR SHOW AT CAMP CULLOM
