#### Silent? Holy?

Have you ever made the statement, "I'm so glad Christmas is coming!" As children these kinds of words might have come out of a sense of excitement and wonder for the season. We might have said them because we hoped we would be getting that favorite item we asked for.

As adults, we utter the same words because we hope the Christmas season will help us get our minds off all the stresses and trials of life. Even though the season certainly produces a whole list of anxieties we only have to deal with once a year, it still is a chance to hopefully stand back for a little bit from the struggles we have faced over the months. And we sing or hum or listen to music which reminds us of a distant time or a distant experience when life seemed so much simpler. Maybe this is why the pattern of starting to listen to Christmas music and putting up Christmas decorations has begun earlier and earlier over the past many years.

However, in our hope that Christmas will produce some kind of renewed hope, rekindled joy, and revived relationships, we need to stop for a minute and consider what the birth of Christ might have looked like.

Was it a "silent night, holy night"? No doubt it was holy. After all, God was coming to earth in the form of a helpless infant child. But silent? Seriously?

You might remember the verse, "she wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger because there was no room for them in the inn." (Luke 2:7) Mary placed the child in a manger (an animal-feed trough). This one point alone has caused artists and poets and lyricists and playwrights, and pastors, and authors, and a host of others to add a variety of animals to the event. If the child was put in a feed trough, there must have been all the rest of the expected surroundings. Maybe yes. Maybe not. The Bible doesn't say.

Later on, in Luke 2:16 we read that the shepherds hurried off and found Mary, Joseph, and the baby, lying in the manger. And then they went and told everybody. The point I am trying to make is not to doubt whether or not all the actors in our traditional nativity scenes were actually there and whether it was in a barn or not. My point is that no matter how much we try to imagine, the night of the birth of the Messiah—God come to earth was anything but silent. Holy? Yes. Silent? No!

There were the sounds of a woman in labor and then the cries of a newborn infant. Eventually there were the sounds of sheepherders come to celebrate. And yes, if the feed trough was in a barn, then there could have been the sound of a host of animals. It's all really lovely to imagine. But I am guessing it wasn't silent. As much as we try to hope. Therefore, when the Advent and Christmas season doesn't go as planned. When everything seems out of sort even though all you want is some peaceful moments in candlelight by a Christmas tree. When the pressures of having everything "just right" seem to about drive you into a panic, take heart. The One whose birth we celebrate did not come at a peaceful time, and most likely was not very silent. Holy? Yes. Silent? Probably not.

Think about these things as you prepare. Fret not when all is not well. Instead, lean on the One whose birth we celebrate. Jesus Christ. His birth was probably not peaceful. But following Him as the Lord of Life and the Light of the World, can bring peace to our soul. After all, the words were foretold "he shall be called ..."the prince of peace" (Isaiah 9:6)

## HANDBELL CHOIR REHEARSAL & PERFORMANCE


